



Tonight's lecture – Professor James Thompson 'The first Labour Government 1924'





Professor James Thompson of Bristol University's research focuses on the political and intellectual history of Britain since 1850. He has written about class, Victorian scandals and trade unions. His book British political culture and idea of 'public opinion', 1867-1914 examines how Britons understood 'public opinion' before opinion polls. He is currently examining the visual culture of British politics from the 1860s to the 1930s through posters, banners, films and photographs. Tonight his timely lecture looks at the minority Labour government who took power a go a hundred years ago.
